

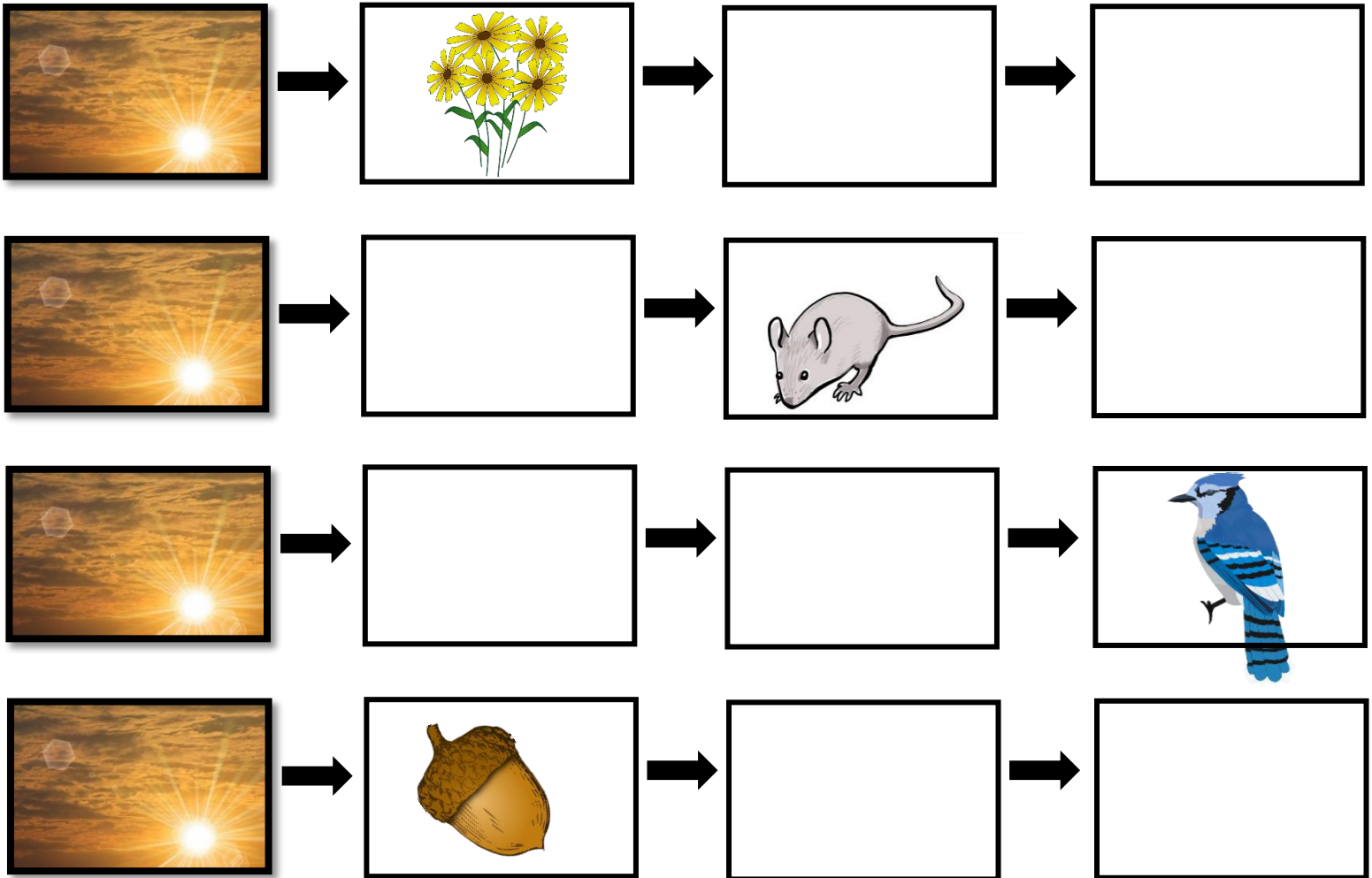


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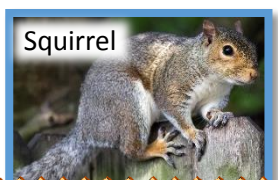
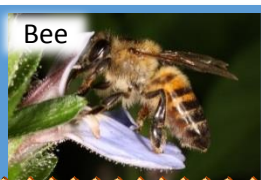
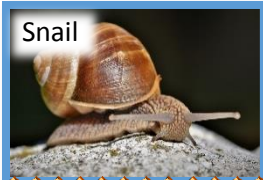
Food Chain Scavenger Hunt

Starting with the sun, place the plants and animals in the garden into a food chain with a drawing or label, and match it to its food source.

Example: Flowers “eat” sunlight, bees eat flower nectar, and woodpeckers eat bees.

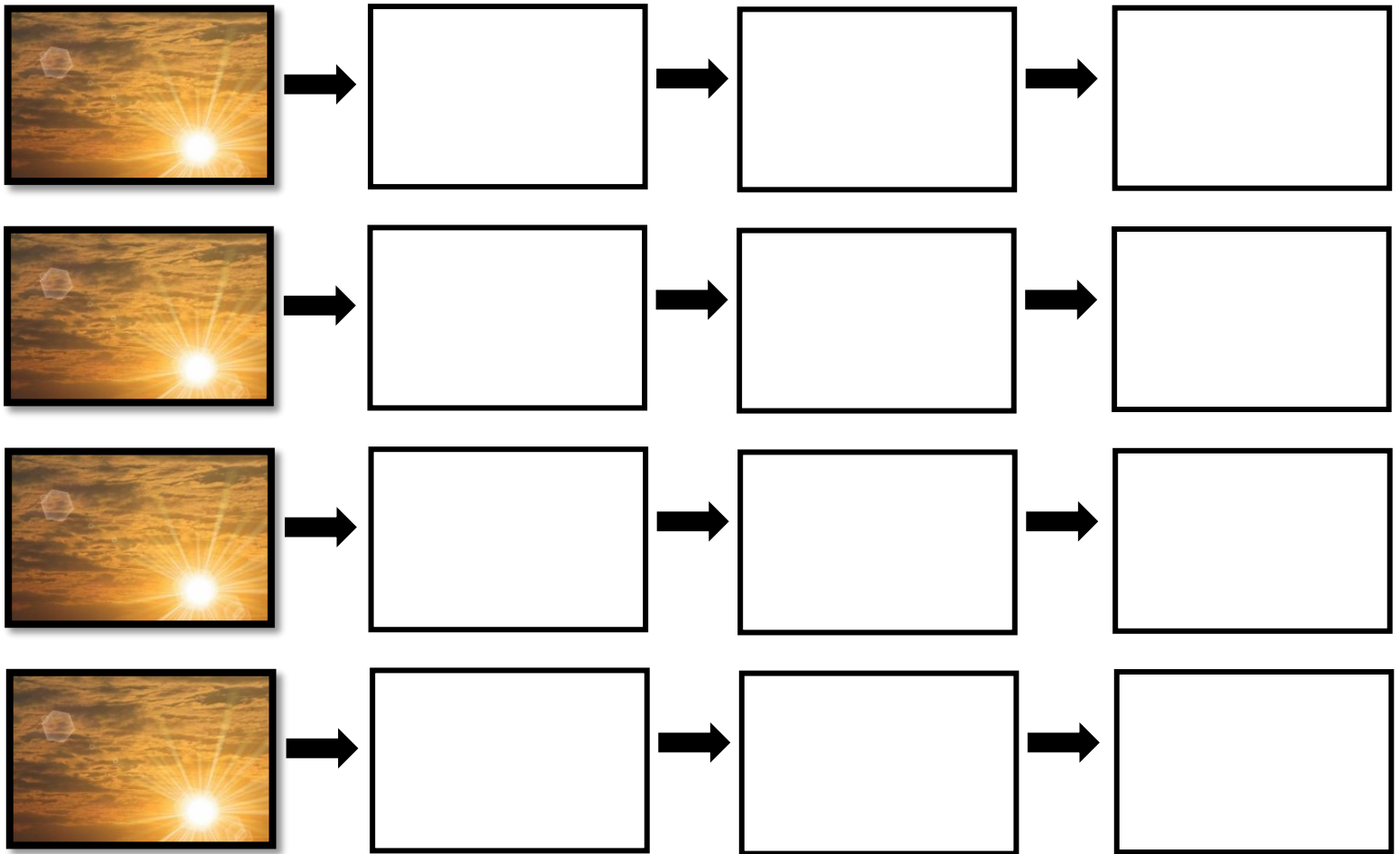


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Food Chain Scavenger Hunt
