

# NEW YORK RESTORATION PROJECT RELAUNCHES FREE Tree Giveaways Throughout NYC

## NYRP WILL DISTRIBUTE 2,000 INDIVIDUAL, NATIVE SPECIES TREES WITH COMMUNITY PARTNERS THROUGHOUT ALL 5 BOROUGHS

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**NEW YORK, NY – March 15, 2022 – <u>New York Restoration Project</u> (NYRP) is thrilled to revive free tree giveaways with community partners throughout New York City. Beginning <b>April 16, 2022** and continuing through May 2022, NYRP will distribute 2,000 individual trees.

NYRP started the very popular free tree giveaways in 2010 as part of the <u>MillionTreesNYC</u> initiative, which they led in partnership with the NYC Parks Department. While MillionTreesNYC finished in 2015, the annual tree giveaway program continued until March 2020 when the COVID-19 pandemic put all in-person events on pause. The new tree giveaway season marks the long-anticipated return of this beloved citywide program.

Native tree species to be distributed include Serviceberry, River Birch, Hornbeam, Hackberry, Redbud, Persimmon, Eastern Red Cedar, Sweetbay Magnolia, Black Gum, Black Cherry, and Swamp White Oak.

As the climate crisis intensifies, trees play an essential role in New York City's environmental resilience by providing shade, creating wildlife habitat, reducing temperatures, improving air quality, and mitigating storm water run-off. NYRP, with the financial support of Bloomberg Philanthropies, is committed to ensuring these benefits are equitably distributed throughout the city.

Free tree recipients **<u>must register</u>** in advance at <u>www.nyrp.org/freetree</u> starting <u>**March 15, 2022**</u>. New dates will be announced in the coming weeks. Confirmed dates, partners, and locations include:

"Last month, I joined with my fellow Borough Presidents in calling for the Million More Trees program, which will protect New Yorkers in every neighborhood against a number of environmental risks and the addition of more trees has the potential to save lives. New York Restoration Project's free tree program is a great step towards adding more trees in all five boroughs and I am thrilled that the program is relaunching."

"We're grateful for New York Restoration Project's commitment to helping us plant more trees in New York and making that a little easier by giving families free trees to plant themselves," said **Brooklyn Borough President Antonio Reynoso**. "It shouldn't be a privilege for New Yorkers to have clean air to breathe and a healthy landscape to enjoy.
